Children receive a variety of music provision during their time at SS Mary and John's. Children in Reception, Year 1, 2, 3, 5 and 6 are taught using units from the Charanga Model Music Scheme. Charanga's English Model Music Curriculum Scheme is aligned with the National Curriculum for Music and the non-statutory Model Music Curriculum (MMC) Guidance published by the DfE in 2021.

This Scheme provides clearly-sequenced units and lessons with week-by-week support for each year group. There are lesson plans, assessment documentation, a clear learning progression, as well as engaging and exciting songs and resources to support every lesson. Key Learning and Outcomes with 'I Can' statements are provided to be used alongside assessment grids.

The scheme follows a spiral approach to musical learning, with children revisiting, building and extending their knowledge and skills incrementally. In this manner, their learning is consolidated and augmented, increasing musical confidence and enabling them to go further. Teachers can adapt their teaching to respond to the strengths and needs of the children they teach.

Children in Year 4 receive instrumental Guitar lessons from a Services for Education staff member. These are whole-class lessons, and each child is provided with a brass

instrument. The Services for Education teacher uses Charanga as a teaching tool during these lessons.

We have access to glockenspiels and African Djembe drums. The glockenspiels are played by children in Y2. In Year 3, as well as their main Music lesson pupils participate in a recorder lesson each week to build on and cement their learning. Y6 have the opportunity to learn how to play the djembe drums.

SEND

Differentiation and support is put in place so that all children can access music in class. The music lead and SENCO regularly discuss and, if needed, put support place so that any potential barriers to accessing music lesson are overcome. For example, this may include an adapted instrument, adult support, adaptive technology or a quieter setting.

Part B: Co-curricular music

This is about opportunities for pupils to sing and play music, outside of lesson time, including choirs, ensembles and bands, and how pupils can make progress in music beyond the core curriculum.

Ensemble

Choir

Choir club is offered for Year 1 and 2 children for an after-school club from 3.30 pm - 4.15 pm once a week. There is no charge for this provision. The children learn a number of different music pieces, in particular hymns that we sing at school and there is a free choice song each week too. Choir on Key Stage 2 is open for children in Y3-6. This is an after-school club from 3.40-4.20 pm once a week. The choir clubs are run by ECT+1 staff and staff who have recently completed their ECT. The children who join the choir remain with the choir for the whole academic year – if further children wish to join, they are able to.

Whole School Music

Hymn Practice

Both Key Stage 1 and Key Stage 2 have Hymn Practice on a regular basis. During this assembly, children both practise hymns they already know and learn new hymns. Sometimes, children are given the choice of the hymns they sing. Children will frequently lead the school in doing sign language alongside the singing.

Assemblies

In every Gospel or Celebration Assembly, the children engage with the music chosen and sing a hymn either at the start or end of the assembly.

Masses

Children regularly attend mass where hymns and responses are sung. Mass is open to the parish who join in with the children for the hymns

Instrument Loans

<u>Guitars</u>

Every child in Year 4 is given an allocated classical guitar for the academic year. This is used for all guitar lessons and is kept in school.

Recorders

Children in Y3 are given a school recorder or they can bring in their own recorder from home.

School offers a subsidy for families which are experiencing hardship or disadvantaged. As part of our pupil premium strategy, school offers targeted clubs for those who do not engage.

<u>LAC</u> children are offered one to one guitar tuition each week for 30 minutes.

<u>SEND</u>

Support and provision is put in place so that all children can access extra-curricular music.

Part C: Musical experiences

This is about all the other musical events and opportunities that we organise, such as singing in assembly, concerts and shows, and trips to professional concerts.

Choir

Children in choir club (Year 1-6) have an opportunity to perform at a range of musical events throughout the year: -

Assembly – A number of times throughout the year, choir will perform to the rest of the school. –

Parish events – Choir will perform to the local community at Parish events, such as the Christmas Fayre.

MAC Events – Choir will perform alongside children from our MAC schools in a Christmas Carol Service.

Year 4 Guitar Pupils

Assembly – the children perform to their parents at the end of the academic year where they can showcase all of the notations they can read and music they can perform.

Other Musical Instruments

Performances of the recorders or glockenspiels are included within class assemblies or when members of the parish are invited in to listen to what they have learnt.

Class Performances

Throughout the year, each class performs to the rest of the school and parents.

- Reception The Reception children perform the Nativity involving singing.
- Year 1and 2 Perform the Nativity including a number of songs
- Years 3 6 Perform a Carol Service to friends and family in our church.
- Class Assemblies Children in Year 1 5 perform a class assembly which involves a number of songs.
- Y6 Production In July, Year 6 rehearse and perform an end of year production which involves acting and singing. The children will perform dress rehearsals to the children in school. They then get the opportunity to perform to their friends and family members.

Opportunities to watch live music

- Whole School In July 2024, all year groups have had the opportunity to watch and accompany One Life Music in a retreat day. They have learnt new songs and the signing to go with them.
- Local school performances throughout the year, the children are invited to attend performances at other local secondary school including St Edmund Campion and Bishop Walsh. Previously KS2 children have attended a performance of Matilda the Musical at St Edmund Campion.
- In addition to the above, the Music lead will annually review live music opportunities that are affordable for children across the school to attend.

In the future

This is about what the school is planning for subsequent years.

- The music lead will strategically review the skills across the music curriculum to ensure the implementation is consistent and effective. The music lead will look for opportunities across the MAC for provision and sharing of good practice to develop the quality of teaching and learning in music.
- Through monitoring and spotlight assessments, music lead will identify trends of attainment and gaps in learning informing future professional development for staff.
- In subsequent years, the music lead and SENCO will annually review the needs of SEND children and adapt accordingly with external agencies.
- Music lead to annually review live music opportunities for the children to attend.
