- Sharing ideas in class and trusting everyone's input.

Stewardship

Why do we care for God's creation at SS Mary and John's?

In our lives, this can look like:

- Recycling and reducing waste at home and school.
- · Planting trees or flowers to care for nature.
- Turning off lights and taps to save energy and water.
- Looking after animals and respecting the environment.



Sofia the Sloth reminds us that God has trusted us to care for creation and protect the Earth for future generations.

Preferential Option for the Poor

Who are the people most in need that we remember across the school year at 55 Mary and John's?

In our lives, this can look like:

- Donating food, clothes, or money to charities.
- · Including and helping people who may be struggling.
- · Speaking kindly and standing up for those who are left out.
- · Praying for people in need around the world.

Solidarity

In our lives, this can look like:

- Making friends with people from different cultures or backgrounds.
- · Joining together to support a cause, like a charity fundraiser.

Distributive Justice

Why is it important to share the world's goods fairly so that everyone has what they need?



- Sharing toys, books, and resources with others.
- Making sure everyone has a turn or a fair chance.
- Donating to charities that help people who have less.
- Encouraging fairness at school and in games.

Human Dignity

God says everyone is special. How are you special?

In our lives, this can look like:

- At school: Including everyone in games, being kind to someone who feels left out.
- At home: Treating brothers, sisters, and family with respect, even when we argue.
- In the community: Helping someone in need, smiling at others, listening patiently.
- Globally: Respecting people of all cultures, races, and abilities.



Luca the Deer reminds us that each of us is made in God's image. This means that everyone is special. We should treat every person the same way we want to be treated.

Common Good

How do you decide what is best for everyone and not just yourself?

In our lives, this can look like:

- At school: Sharing fairly, including everyone in games, not leaving anyone out.
- At home: Helping with chores so everyone shares the work.
- In the community: Volunteering, helping neighbours, keeping public spaces clean.
- Globally: Supporting fairness, caring for creation, and thinking about how our choices affect others.
